<u>Chairperson Report</u>	<p><u>Interprofessional Workgroup</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The Interprofessional Workgroup is actively engaged, and all Board Chairs have met with DC Health’s leadership team in the past two weeks. • Several vaccination initiatives are moving forward in response to COVID-19 coronavirus, the flu and RSV; with a goal of immunizing/vaccinating many District residents. • Board Chairs are encouraged to work together to improve the health of the District of Columbia. The Chairs were also asked to meet offline to discuss the initiatives that are most important to their communities. • DC Health is currently drafting an omnibus bill proposing several updates to the Health Occupations Revisions Act (HORA). <p>In light of the request from the Interprofessional Workgroup, Board Chair, Dr. McCants requests the following of the Board of Pharmacy executive members:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. An initiative(s) that the Board of Pharmacy could champion in collaboration with other Boards. 2. A response from the Board of Pharmacy concerning its interest in meeting with all executive Board members from the healthcare Boards housed by DC Health via a forum, or an educational initiative or a social event. <p>Board Member, Dr. Allison Hill expressed interest in a social event with other healthcare Boards.</p> <p>Board Member, Dr. Benjamin Miles suggests that the DC Board of Pharmacy’s collaboration with the DC Board of Medicine concerning collaborative practice agreements must be revisited.</p> <p>Vice Chair, Mr. Alan Friedman requests that the status of the Board of Pharmacy’s initiative on hormonal contraception prescription by pharmacists is an agenda item if collaborative efforts with the Board of Medicine is forthcoming.</p> <p>Board Chair, Dr. McCants will submit the Board of Pharmacy’s suggestions to the Interprofessional Workgroup at its next meeting.</p>	Dr. Tamara McCants

Prescription Drug Monitoring Program Updates

- All pharmacists are reminded to register for the *Prescription Drug Monitoring Program* (PDMP) within ninety (90) days of licensure in the District of Columbia. As a reminder, new licensees will receive notifications regarding registration for the program every thirty (30) days after licensure.
- The PDMP Advisory Committee will meet on Tuesday, December 6, 2022 from 10:00 am to 11:30 am, in Room 216 at DC Health. For more information on the meeting as well as the program, please go to:

DCRx (DC Center for Rational Prescribing)

- The DC Center for Rational Prescribing will facilitate a continuing education credit module concerning food insecurity. The forthcoming course is titled "*Addressing Food Insecurity in Patients with Chronic Diseases.*"
- A telehealth module is currently in development and will be available by the end of December, 2022.
- The *DCRx Learner Experience Survey* was disseminated in the pharmacy community with the intention of identifying topics of interests for future DCRx educational programming. The Board encourages the pharmacy community to complete the survey by December 15, 2022.

Office of Government Relations (OGR) Updates

- Council Period 24 will conclude on December 31, 2022. Any legislation that has not been passed by then, will be reconsidered during Period 25.
- The Committee on Health will have new membership in the upcoming Council Period. The Office of Government Relations (OGR) will provide updates on the Committee's membership during the Board of Pharmacy's next open session meeting.

Committee on Health Mark-Up

- The Committee on Health held its final mark-up of on November 21, 2022. Any bills that were not marked up during this meeting, or have not been marked up during a previous meeting, will be reintroduced in Council Period 25.
- One of the bills marked up was the *Protecting Health Professionals Providing Reproductive Health Care Amendment Act of 2022 (B24-0830)*.
 - *This proposed legislation would prevent DC Health licensing boards from taking certain actions, including the revocation or suspension of a license, against a licensed healthcare professional for providing or facilitating reproductive health or gender affirming services when that service falls within the professional's scope of practice, and the disciplinary action is based exclusively on the patient residing in a jurisdiction where such services are prohibited. The protections contained in this bill also apply to providers that prescribe or distribute medications for abortion or gender affirming care.*

Clinical Laboratory Professionals:

- The *Clinical Laboratory Practitioners Amendment Act of 2022 (B24-0764)* seeks to move the licensing and oversight of laboratory professionals from the Board of Pharmacy to the Board of Medicine. Additionally, it changes the requirements to become either a Clinical Laboratory Director or Practitioner.
- This bill was scheduled to be marked up during the recent Committee on Health meeting, but the committee decided to hold off on consideration of this legislation until Council Period 25.

Pharmacist and Pharmacy Technician Renewals

- Renewals are set to begin on December 5, 2022, as an email announcing the opening of the renewal period was disseminated throughout the District's pharmacy community on December 2, 2022.
- All renewal applications are accessible at <https://doh.force.com/dchealthrenewals/s/portal-page>.
- All pharmacists are required to register with the DC PDMP before renewing their licenses.
- Licensees with *Vaccination and Immunization Authority* are required to maintain current CPR certification in Basic Life Support, as well as complete two (2) hours of continuing education relevant to the administration of immunizations and vaccinations.

In response to Vice Chair, Mr. Alan Friedman's question concerning communicating the changes in continuing education requirements,

	<p>Executive Director, Dr. Justin Ortique states that the email blast as well as the renewal portal will provide a link to the public health priorities, which will account for ten percent (10%) of the continuing education credits required for licensure renewal.</p> <p>Board Chair, Dr. McCants reports on the White House conference on hunger, which emphasized the need to allow healthcare professionals to link food and food insecurities with healthcare. Emerging models, especially in pharmacy will merge food and health. Dr. McCants encourages the pharmacy community to complete the continuing education credit course on the subject matter, which is offered by DCRx.</p>

(b) Uniform Telehealth Act Drafted by The National Conference of Commissioners On Uniform State Laws. (c) National Conference of Commissioners on Uniform State Laws - "Why Your State Should Adopt the Uniform Telehealth Act" (d) Draft Bill 10-12-22 (Uniform Telehealth Act of 2022)</p> <p>Telehealth is designed such that the physician is required to have authority to practice in the state where the patient resides. The drafted Uniform Telehealth Bill requires a registration with requirements that are comparable to the standard licensure process in the District.</p> <p>The questions before the Board for consideration are:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. How is the telehealth registration process different from the established licensure process? Does the registration process move faster than the standard licensure process? <p>The drafted Bill also restricts the registration to telehealth services only; a physician is not allowed to provide in-person services to a patient.</p>	

	<p>2. How does the Board monitor telehealth registered physicians?</p> <p>Under the drafted bill, “practitioner” includes a pharmacist. Whereas the District has established, but old telehealth regulations concerning telepharmacy, the subcommittee is reviewing all regulations including those concerning telepharmacy, which must be updated.</p> <p>Board Counsel, Ms. Carla Williams therefore suggests that the Board of Pharmacy refers the drafted Uniform Telehealth Bill to the Legislative and Regulatory Subcommittee for review and discussion.</p> <p>No motion entered for this matter.</p>

<p>1201-O-04</p>	<p><u>Legislative and Regulatory Subcommittee Report</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The Legislative and Regulatory Subcommittee has held two meetings, one of which was held to discuss the workforce survey. • The subcommittee has temporarily suspended its discussion concerning the workforce survey to discuss the legislative changes to the HORA. • In its review and update of the definition of the “practice of pharmacy,” the subcommittee has added the word “biologicals” and moved the following language: <i>“prescribing and dispensing of self-administered hormonal contraceptives when certified by the Board of Pharmacy to do so and in accordance with regulations promulgated by the Board of Pharmacy and the Board of Medicine,”</i> to better serve the definition of “practice of pharmacy.” • To view the Legislative and Regulatory Subcommittee’s further changes to the HORA, please see the attached document. • Board Member, Dr. Allison Hill observes that the word “assessment” is not included in the updated definition of the “practice of pharmacy.” • Board Member, Dr. Benjamin Miles suggests that additional language is not necessary at this time. • Board Counsel, Ms. Carla Williams suggests that a pharmacist’s assessment can be addressed in the regulations, in lieu of the HORA. <p><u>Motion</u></p> <p>Motion: Board Member, Dr. Benjamin Miles moves the Board to accept the changes to the HORA as presented, with an exception: the [executive] Board should remain as five (5) pharmacist members, in lieu of four (4).</p>	<p>Mr. Alan Friedman</p>
